THEME

Our spiritual birthright is to be able to experience and apply the energy of Divine Love throughout every aspect of our lives. Our focus is 'one-ing'. LOOKING FORWARD: OPPORTUNITIES AND NEEDS

We are abundantly blessed with the various cultures and traditions that are a part of the community from various demographics within the community, cultural backgrounds, and religious traditions. All of this asks us to respect deeply our difference of opinion and be open to be enriched by this variety. We are called 'that all may be one' reflecting the profound diversity of God in unity and Trinity guided by the Spirit.

During April, I was contacted by Dr Carol Coburn, director of Archives and research center at Avila University to tell me that their archives is now closed. During 2022 Avila hired a new president who announced that he was discontinuing the university's focus on liberal arts and research. By mid 2023 he closed the archives and research center. The university archivist was



then only with authorization from Dr Coburn. I have been in conversation with Dr Coburn, who assures me that our SFCC documents and materials remain safe and secure into the immediate future. She does recommend, however, that we move our collection to another archive center.



Dr Coburn connected me with the archivist at Marquette University (Jesuit), Amy Cary, who has expressed interest in the SFCC Collection. Marquette houses the most complete post Vatican II activist collection in North America: NCAN, Sister Formation, Selma (US Civil Rights Movement), Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs, National Catholic Conference on Racial Justice (NCCIJ),

Ritamary Bradley Papers, Annette Walters Papers. Marquette believes SFCC is a good fit with their existing collection. The archivist hopes that I will add more documents and materials.

The move is in the earliest stages. The archivist must take the proposal to the university President and to the board of directors. The Director of Research and university library will also be consulted. Then negotiations begin and legal documents signed. It takes time and I promise to post updates here and in the coming issues of the ATA. - *Submitted by Fran Campbell*

BUSINESS SESSION COLLEGIAL PROCESS REPORT

The Business Meeting was facilitated by Roberta Kardell with Alma O'Brien acting as recorder and Carmen Gillick as timekeeper. Roberta gave the initial presentation of the collegial process. Before beginning the clarification of the proposals/recommendations, Fran Campbell explained the need for funding an upgrade of the SFCC website. The community approved gifting \$5000 from the ATA reserve to do so.

Fran also addressed the current changes at Avila University. The archivist at Avila has been dismissed and the university is no longer a center for research. Therefore, negotiations are underway to move SFCC archives to Marquette University in Wisconsin.

At the beginning of eac session Roberta reviewed the steps of the collegial process. Results of the consensus session are as follows:

Proposal I: Communication Coordinators (Networking) (Submitted by the Florida Region, clarified by Mary Steves).

We propose, with modifications from the Assembly floor if any, **that we initiate a new role of National Communications Coordinator in**

locations as appropriate or needed to optimize communication and support connections in community.

Proposal was withdrawn by the Florida Region.

Proposal 2: Process for Fostering Global Community (Submitted and clarified by Roz Frampton).

I propose, with modifications from the Assembly floor if any, that regions link up with regions in other continents at least once each year to build global community and that an organizational system be designed to foster this linkage.

The proposal was modified as follows so that it became a recommendation:

In order to facilitate understanding of our cultural diversity and fulfillment of our charism, "That all may be one," regions are encouraged to communicate globally with other regions at times to be determined by each region.

Consensus: The modification was affirmed.

Recommendation I: Communication Sources (Submitted by the Florida region and clarified by Mary Steves).

We recommend, with modifications from the Assembly floor if any, that there be one dedicated communication site dedicated to sharing SFCC updates so that every SFCC has access and the ability to remain informed on community happenings, process, and other pertinent information about developments within and/or affecting SFCC.

Consensus: Not affirmed.

Recommendation 2: Website Restructuring (Submitted and clarified by Roz Frampton).

I recommend, with modifications from the Assembly floor if any, that the website be the one central media source for key information and be updated to allow for various types of software to be uploaded such as PowerPoint presentations and while centrally maintained, named people should be enabled to upload information to specific areas of the website, relevant to their country or agreed areas of focus. I further recommend that the first of February, June, and October be identified as times for regions to check the accuracy of website data and to provide updates where required. The ATA should be placed on this website for the majority, and just continue to be sent out, as now, to those who cannot access the website.

Consensus: Not affirmed.

Recommendation 3: ICC Responsibilities (Submitted and clarified by Roz Frampton).

I recommend, with modifications from the Assembly floor if any, that the ICCs divide responsibilities across continents, rather than by continents.

Consensus: Not affirmed.

Evaluator's Report: Appears elsewhere in this ATA.

A new ICC Team was not affirmed. The five sisters who offered to serve in the ICC role will continue their discernment and reach a decision by November 2023. If no team results, then the process will be initiated anew with names submitted by the February-March 2024 ATA and a new team will be affirmed at the 2024 Assembly. There would then be no transition year.

The following service roles were affirmed:

ATA Team: Margaret Gonsalves, Carmela Chetcuti, Mary Rose Accetturo

Archivists: Africa-Marta Nyaga, Asia-TBA, Europe-Carmen Notario, Americas-Karol Jackowski.

Website Team: Fran Campbell, Rose Miles.

Assembly 2024 will be held in Jacksonville, Florida, USA from August 14 - 18, 2024.

Assembly Team: Mary Rose Accetturo, Rita Yeasted and Denise Ware.

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There was discussion concerning the 2025 assembly in the Philippines, either at the retreat center or the Midas Hotel in Manila. Strong Wi-Fi connection must be considered. Dates and its impact on future Assemblies will be resolved at the 2024 Assembly.

And, finally, we addressed the synodal issue of speaking in a prophetic voice to expose what is evil without further fragmenting local faith communities: how can we deal honestly with what divides us?

Region members met via Zoom 17 September. Present were: Gert Bassey, Mary Balogun, Teresa Maiyamma, Onemena Oghenejode, Affiliates: Stella Chibuoke, Pauline Famiyro, Bernadette Sampson and Inquirer Nneka Okoro. Fran Campbell was present as a guest.

Gert Bassey led the opening prayer and introduces topics of discussion, which included expectations in accepting candidates to an inquiry stage. Based on a series of problems, it was suggested that the region require an official letter of dismissal from previous community, as well as a thorough investigation of potential Inquirers. However, Fran pointed out that, although SFCC does not normally request a dismissal letter it is personal to the Inquirer, the South Nigeria Region does need to put a temporary system in place. Fran also noted that SFCC welcomes everyone to the Becoming Process; but filters out those who bring serious problems to both the local SFCC region and to the SFCC global membership. In closing, Fran reminded the region that no one in the Becoming Process is guaranteed to be affirmed. It was decided to form a small committee to recommend initial interview options, which will be discussed by the region members at our next meeting.

We discussed attendance at the monthly Becoming Process zoom sessions. Those in the Becoming Process are required to participate in each session to follow up with their mentor. Affirmed are strongly encouraged to continue to attend the sessions in order to learn more details about SFCC, as well as prepare to serve as mentors in the near future. The sessions for 2023 are ended. 2024 will begin in January.

As a means of nurturing open spiritual reflection, we decided to use our region WhatsApp chat to post a scripture quote once a week, asking each to post a brief reflection about it. Gert will be responsible to select the quotes.

Fran explained the concepts of both geographic and intentional regions and the process of how each are created in SFCC. She stressed that it is important that SFCC develop a positive reputation within the local dioceses, parishes, as well as among our co-workers. We must be genuine and authentic to our vows and to the SFCC mission and vision at all times.

We closed with a prayer led by Gert. Following the meeting, the affirmed members held a discernment session during which it was the consensus for Nneka to move into the Affiliate Stage and for Bernadette Sampson to be affirmed. The ceremonies will take place at the region gathering in December. It was also the consensus that Stella Chibuoke begins an in-depth study of the evangelical vows as understood by SFCC. A discernment session will be convened in early December regarding her possible affirmation later that same month.

The sisters who were present in Nairobi shared their own difficulty in communicating because of the language barrier. All the sisters present spoke English but with their own country's accent. The question was posed as to how we get to know the sisters from other cultures and overcome the language barrier as we become more global? It was suggested that we need to listen with a new set of ears, fully attentive and
